

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
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Our education programs are provided




Let the river run ... with poetry. Washington's poet laureate, Claudia Castro Luna, has been named an Academy of American Poets Laureate Fellow, one of 13 state or local poets laureate nationwide to be so honored in a program intended to promote civic programs about the role that poetry plays in people's lives.

Castro Luna's winning proposal is to convene a series of poetry writing workshops and readings along the Columbia River, from the point it enters the northeastern corner of Washington to its encounter with the Pacific Ocean. The main thrust of the project will be to highlight the importance of the river as a natural resource.


Castro Luna, will launch her first project in Pateros, WA following teaching students in public schools through Methow Arts' education residencies for two-days. She will offer a workshop in Pateros on Sat, Oct 19 followed by a reading in which local poets will join her that evening. Visit Twisp this Fall

If you're a regular subscriber to Methow Arts Magazine, then you know that Twisp is home to an active artist community comprised of galleries, studios, theater, and more. No matter which time you visit this fall, get a start on the day with a locally-made award-winning coffee or organic smoothie and head down Glover Street to check out the town's charming


Stop by TwispWorks—a former Forest Service complex turned eclectic studio space—for a peek at public art adorning the campus. If visiting on a Saturday, stop by the Twisp Farmers Market (open 9am-Noon through October) before touring TwispWorks' studios during open house (11am-3pm). For a quick walk about town, take a self-guided art tour. The Confluence Gallery and Art Center is a great place to start, offering free galleries and rotating exhibits.

Not only is Twisp the heart of the Methow Valley – it's also known for its scenic beauty. From Glover Street, it's a short half-mile walk (or drive) west along Twisp River Road to the Twisp Ponds, a haven of scenic paths between native plants and rearing ponds. Art and nature coexist at the ponds, where you'll find large-scale installations backed by stands of willow and black cottonwood. Between the various birds and busy beavers, you're almost guaranteed a wildlife sighting.

For a bit more exercise and epic views, Lookout Mountain can't be beat. This hike to a historic fire lookout tower is located approximately 8 miles from Twisp. Generally accessible through October, the 3-mile round trip trail delivers hikers through pine grass, lupine, and ponderosa pine to 360-degree valley views at 5,500 feet. It's the perfect fall hike in the Methow Valley.


Restore your calories back in downtown Twisp with tacos, burgers, pizza or pasta from a block's worth of family-owned restaurants. Then finish your night with one last dose of art: a live theater performance at The Merc Playhouse, a music concert at the Methow Valley Community Center (courtesy of Cascadia Music), Sip & Paint with Methow Arts or even live music by the river at Twisp River Suites.


Twisp Fall Art Walk & Studio Tour

First People of the Methow: Methow Mapping Project

An informational map has just been printed which provides an introduction to the Methow Valley and its First People. The map connects users with walking trails and interpretive sites as well as historical

Over ten thousand years ago, the Methow Valley was covered in glaciers up to a mile thick, the tallest peaks in a sea of ice. As the ice receded, the First People settled throughout the Methow Valley, where food and cultural resources were available. They established several trails and trade routes and traded goods with the coastal and plains regions.

Their descendants, the Methow, continue to live in this region, teaching and practicing cultural traditions passed down through hundreds of

Methow Valley Jewelry Collective coming to TwispWorks Campus

When local silversmith and jeweler, Sarah Jo Lightner, opened her jewelry studio on the TwispWorks campus ten years ago she did so with the long-term vision of creating a community resource where local jewelers could both create and showcase their art.

Currently four jewelers operate out of the Glitter & Grit Studio. Kelleigh McMillan, who learned the craft from Lightner, is inspired by the lines and forms she sees in nature and reinterprets them in her silver and mixed metal pieces. Kevin Nielsen is the creative force behind The Lumen Naturae. His work features natural stones collected by hand from around the world and set in handcrafted silver. The newest jeweler to join the collective is Cassie Head of Early Winters Design. Taking her inspiration from the ridgelines of the valley, Cass crafts beautiful rings for finger

Later this fall Glitter & Grit will move into a larger space in the Bernard Hosey Building transforming into The Methow Valley Jewelry Collective. The larger facility will allow for more artists to join the Collective including jewelers Joanne Marracci, Sandy Woodbury, Michelle Brouwer, Phoebe Ruud and lapidarist Martin Novak. It will create a community jeweler space with dedicated workshop and retail space. The Collective plans to be open in time for the holiday shopping season. 

Tamera Abaté finds endless potential in a horizon. "I'm pretty fascinated with ridgelines and horizon lines," she said.

Abaté explores that fascination in abstract encaustic paintings, which feature wide, horizontal bands of luminescent color done in melted wax.

Abaté knows those landscapes intimately – she grew up on a wheat farm near Moses Lake and has also lived on the ocean. "There were huge horizon lines – they weren't chopped up by mountains like in the Methow," she said. "I thought I could practically see the curvature of the earth, it's such a long line. What's behind it seems like the edge of something."

While the horizontal fields of aqua, ivory, and rust in a painting may suggest an ocean landscape in the sunset, or wheat fields beneath wispy clouds, the paintings aren't meant to represent anything that precise. Abaté's work is abstract, more about motion and her mood than any specific place or subject.

"Someone in the Winthrop Gallery said he got lost in my painting," Abaté said. "That's the perfect compliment – that's what it's supposed to do." It's the open-ended effect she'd to have on everyone. "What do those colors mean to you?" she said. While she has always been driven to make art — and has sold everything from rhinestone-studded T-shirts to pottery — Abaté has had little formal art education. "I always need to do something with my hands. I was raised that way — working on the farm was a very physical childhood," she said.

Abaté's family was artistic, but the demanding farm schedule left little time for art making. Her grandmother was a talented oil painter of landscapes and her mother sewed and dabbled in art when she had the chance.

As a kid, Abaté collected pens, markers, and paper, which she preserved in a special box. "Sewing was the most art-related thing I did as a kid," she said.

When her children were young, Abaté would squeeze in time for creativity whenever possible. She painted watercolors while her kids napped, keeping the paintings small so she'd have the satisfaction of finishing, she said.

She also did more elaborate projects, including a series of handmade books, quirky and captivating multi-media creations that unfold into glorious accordions of words and color. Abaté painted the pages and collaged souvenirs from her daily life or travels, and then hand-lettered accounts of their activities.

"Those books would be the first thing I'd take if there was a fire – they're irreplaceable stories of family experiences," Abaté said.

In fact, the handmade books are what led Abaté to encaustics. After she showed her brother a book containing pages she'd covered with melted beeswax, he said it reminded him of encaustics. Abaté looked up the unfamiliar term.

Soon she'd checked out all the library books she could find on encaustics. She taught herself to paint with wax, experimenting with small pictures of birds and abstract color studies. She was hooked. "It's swept me away the last five years," she said.

"The cool thing is that it's pretty environmentally friendly. It's just beeswax and tree resin, with some pigment. There's not a lot of waste," Abaté said.

While rich with saturated color, the wax is translucent enough to reveal complex layers of texture and pattern. Abaté uses a pancake griddle, a warming plate, a tacking iron, and different-sized propane torches – including a tiny one used to caramelize sugar on crème brulée.

The wax can be reused. When Abaté scrapes wax off a painting to expose the layer below, she gathers the curls and shavings to be melted down again. A small forest of colorful stalagmites is growing next to the warming tray where she keeps pots of molten wax. "It's like a gnome

family under there," she said. Those little gnomes also go back in the pot.

Abaté starts a new painting by applying two layers of clear melted wax with a brush. Because the wax dries right away, she melts it with an iron to spread it around the board, smoothing some areas and leaving subtle ridges elsewhere. The ridges show through the subsequent layers of pigmented wax, affecting the color density and adding pattern and texture. Every layer has to be fused to the one beneath it with heat.

"One of the things I really like about encaustics is that there's no other medium with such luminosity and depth," Abaté said. Since the pigment is suspended in clear wax, you can see through each layer, and the final surface glistens. Most paintings get at least 10 layers before they're done.

When Abaté applies base layers of clear wax, she could try to create a design by building up ridges in certain areas. "But that would take the fun out. The high points are like surprises" in the final painting, she said.

Abaté pushes the pigmented wax around on the board with a large propane torch, but there's a limit to how much control she has. "It has a little bit of a mind of its own," she said. "What happens happens, but I can't re-create it." Then she carefully scrapes away layers of wax to reveal colors and textures below.

The layered process leaves hints of color – in tiny flecks, amoebic blotches, and swirling patterns – in an abstract arrangement. Billowy white areas in an azure field suggest clouds; more angular forms

look like birds in flight or sea creatures. Look again and they recall crop patterns seen from an airplane, whitecaps on the water, or a basic study of color and hue.

"I like how meditative and physical it is, particularly on a big piece," Abaté said. Because the wax cools so quickly, she has to work fast. "I love watching it go back and forth from dark to light or light to dark, and how the multiple layers interact," she said.

When she starts a new painting, Abaté has a color scheme in mind – but not a particular place. "Paintings that are more suggestive of landscapes do fit in some degree of realness – for example, the horizon line – even though you would never see that cross-section of earth, horizon, water, and sky," she said.

She realizes that some people still crave a recognizable subject. "When a person looks at abstract art, their brain becomes uncomfortable because they can't identify or categorize it," she said. "It's human nature to categorize what we see."

But many viewers respond to the atmosphere she creates of colors, energy, and motion.

It's common for artists take photos or sketches as reference material, but Abaté has honed her ability to remember the way she feels. "When I'm out in nature – at the beach or in the mountains – I'm always observing the whole landscape, and noticing what emotions arise. Rather than taking a photo, I try to memorize that feeling in my mind, and try to transfer it into a painting," she said.

Abaté does some representational paintings – primarily small paintings of birds and horses that help her experiment with new encaustic techniques. The vividly colored birds aren't meant to be scientifically accurate – they're playful versions of chickadees, hummingbirds, and exotic tropical birds.

Before she became hooked on encaustics, Abaté worked mostly in ceramics. She made mugs and plates decorated with dancing birds and flowers. They were uplifting, with inspiring and humorous sayings. "It was fun to watch people. The mugs made them smile." she said.

She also sculpted ceramic Leaf Spirits – whimsical creatures that were part human and part flower or vegetable, often with an interior void for candles.

But in encaustics, Abaté has found a way to express her experience of nature. "I simply notice things. It's like slow motion, like how the light comes through the trees and the shades of green change as I walk under the tree."

"This has been a good path. I really enjoy where it's taking me. I'm passionate about it," she said.

It's also a business. "It just so happens I love doing it" she said

Abaté's art can be seen in the Methow Valley at the Winthrop Gallery and Confluence Gallery. Her work is also in exhibits at the Gray Sky Gallery in Seattle, the Northwind Arts Center in Port Townsend, and at wineries in Walla Walla and Spokane. tameraabate.com.


The installation, designed and fabricated by sculptor Ed McCarthy of Mazama,



Cool, clear nights brought out the hottest chamber music

On the cusp of its 25th season, the Methow Valley Chamber Music Festival celebrated early this year, with four sold-out concerts on cool June evenings. The refreshing weather offered ample time for the audience members to take in wildflower-studded hillsides on the Festival grounds before the main

The earlier date didn't alter the fundamental approach of the festival – showcasing music by masters of chamber music repertoire like Mozart and Schubert, along with work by lesser-known composers (a moving piano quintet from the 19th century by Hermann Goetz) and compelling contemporary fare.



The Festival welcomed back musicians including violinist Grace Park, violist Ayane Kozasa, and Travis Gore, whose virtuoso performance on the double bass wowed the audience. Two phenomenal pianists were also on hand - Tanya Gabrielian, whose playing is called "revelatory," and, in her Festival debut, Zhenni Li. who's hailed for "torrents of voluptuous sound." Violinists Siwoo Kim and Nikki Chooi also appeared on the Methow stage for the first time.

Other firsts included a brand-new composition by Winthrop-based composer Lynette Westendorf, a setting for the poem that opens each concert. Musicians also played a new composition by long-time festival cellist and composer Paul Wiancko.

The Methow Festival has a well-earned reputation for highlighting contemporary music that appeals to all audiences, from life-long chamber music aficionados to people just discovering that chamber music is anything but staid. Exciting new works included a string quartet celebration of folk music and dance by Jessie Montgomery and an ingeniously playful piece by the young Pulitzer Prize-winning composer Carolyn Shaw.

Although the main Festival was held earlier this year, there was an encore in July when gifted young musicians from the Seattle Cello Academy descended



on the valley. They performed free community concerts in Mazama and Winthrop and received intensive instruction from Festival Artistic Director Kevin Krentz and Haeyoon Shin, the cello academy

Krentz and fellow musicians are already brainstorming a gala concert series for the Festival's 25th season next year, with Centerstage concerts from June 18 to

When Laura Aspenwall took a glass blowing class in 1996 at the Pacific Northwest College of arts in Portland, Oregon, it was like a light bulb went off in her mind. After working as a technical writer for about fifteen years, she was bored and began to explore various art processes. She did drawing and ceramics for about six years, but it was glassblowing that captured her. She liked it because it was immediate, technical, and dangerous. With glassblowing you know you are successful immediately because the object is either on the floor, ruined, or in the annealing box slowly cooling down. No middle ground. By the time Laura moved to the Methow Valley in 2002, she, with the help of her husband, built a glassblowing studio of her own.

Laura creates mostly functional pieces, but the larger, more elaborate ones-vases and plates, for example, are more like art pieces because they are usually used for display. She prefers the challenge of the technique involved in "pulling cane" meaning that she creates thin rods of color to embed in the clear bubble that she blows at the end of the rod. Youth Arts Initiative Pilot Project

Methow Arts has received a generous grant from Icicle Fund that will support a Youth Arts Initiative (YAI) for students in grades K-3 in the Methow Valley Elementary School as well as students in grades K-2 in North Omak Elementary School. Neither school has a designated art teacher, and arts education instruction is not currently provided at a level that meets WA State recommendations for Arts Education Learning Standards. YAI is a threeyear pilot grant that has a goal of increasing the dosage of professional arts education specifically in sequential art learning and basics and elements of art for early grade levels, establishing a foundation in the arts for later years.




'The three-year grant will allow us to strategically invest in the development of learners who understand the critical concepts of art and the design cycle principles. Our

Methow Arts professional teaching artists Bethany Wray and Annie Venable were hired to implement the program as including curriculum development, lesson planning, collaborating with classroom teachers to integrate art into units of study, and teaching

This proposal utilizes Okanogan County data from the 2017 Icicle Fund Youth Arts Opportunities Study, which identified gaps and opportunities, as well as barriers and supporter of youth arts education in Okanogan County. Additional data emphasizing need for this grant is derived from Methow Arts Alliance's evaluation, which collects quantitative and qualitative data annually from school districts across Okanogan County.

Oil & Water Show Highlights the Plein Aire Tradition

Curators Joanne Marracci and Caryl Campbell asked 25 artists to submit paintings that follow the tradition of doing a lot of the painting in the field known as plein aire. The show will feature plein aire artists that work in both oil paint and watercolor paint.



The tradition of plein aire painting goes back centuries, and really you can consider the cave art to be plein aire. Painting what you saw in the landscape and not an idealized concept of what you saw is newer, starting in about 1500. It was really popular in the 1800s. The most famous of these outdoor painters are the impressionists Cezanne, Monet, Cassatt, Renoir and van Gogh.

Of all the artistic practices, plein aire comes with a unique set of hazards. All of the challenges of painting outside gives the work a fresh presence, the bugs in the paint and the wind blowing dust on things. The easel blowing over and the water freezing (some intrepid painters put vodka in the water to keep it from freezing). This adds life to the

Performing Arts Pavilion Coming to TwispWorks Campus

As part of the June 29th 10-year anniversary celebration, TwispWorks announced plans for a performing arts pavilion coming to the TwispWorks Campus in 2020. Two years ago, TwispWorks constructed the Plaza@TwispWorks, a 14,000 square foot outdoor space including pathways, a splash pad for kids to cool off, native plantings and a bike repair station all designed to connect people to the outdoors and creating a space for the celebration of arts and culture. Part of that plan included a pavilion at the west end of the plaza to host events, performances and exhibits. Now, due to the generous support of an anonymous donor, TwispWorks has secured full funding and construction will begin spring 2020.

The 1,000 square foot pavilion will include three sides of movable acoustic walls and state of the art lighting and audio capabilities. As part of TwispWorks mission to support economic vitality through arts and culture, the pavilion will be available to local arts organizations to deliver free programming to the community. This can include musical, dance and theatrical performances as well as art exhibitions and special events all creating a more inviting space for the community to enjoy.

Initially conceived by Brice Butler, TwispWorks partner and architectural firm, Serious Fun Studio, has designed the pavilion as a signature structure on the TwispWorks campus. It visually ties the pavilion into the recent updates to campus including the new Old Schoolhouse Brewery and Taproom. The updates to the TwispWorks campus create a community hub and economic engine optimized for people to walk the campus and enjoy the outdoors, attend events, shop and dine.




