



Ramirez has worked professionally as a performer for the past 35 years and as the academic director at the Instituto Educacional de la Danza Nandehui, a dance school in Xalapa, Mexico. Growing up in Veracruz, Ramírez was surrounded by the music and dance of Son Jarocho. His mother was a dancer and his father was a musician which led him to start performing the music at a young age.

The music and dance ensemble Son Luna y Jóvenes Zapateadores grew from the sounds and rhythm of Veracruz, Mexico — the birthplace of the traditional

As a part of the Methow Arts series, the company will make its Washington State debut with its show "¡Vĺvelo!" at the Barn.

The dance and music ensemble will also visit and perform for six school districts in Okanogan County through Methow Arts Education Programs, ACCESS Arts prior to this event.

The performance focuses on Mexican culture and is "specifically taking the time to look at Mexico as a place of great contemporary performance." "¡VÍvelo!" highlights Son Jarocho, which is a musical blend of Spanish, African and Indigenous styles. It's created through instruments like two types of guitars, the jarana and requinto, along with a cajón



BIG, LUSH SOUND FOR CHAMBER MUSIC FESTIVAL'S 25TH SEASON

The Methow Valley Chamber Music Festival is planning a spectacular program this June to celebrate its 25th season of exceptional chamber music in a relaxed, casual setting.

For the first weekend of the festival, Artistic Director Kevin Krentz has assembled a 16-piece chamber orchestra to feature exceptional chamber music repertoire that demands a big, rich sound. Krentz is considering compositions by Gustav Holst, Edvard Grieg, and Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky. "The Tchaikovsky is rich and lustily vibrant and powerful – just incredible," he said.

The string orchestra will be anchored by members of the renowned Aizuri Quartet, who will be joined by favorite festival musicians.

The following weekend highlights strings and winds in substantial masterworks that are rarely performed. Look for composers such as Schubert and Beethoven, plus a generous dose of Mozart's brilliance, Krentz said.

The Festival welcomes back several artists, including compelling violinist Siwoo Kim, virtuoso violist Ayane Kozasa, and pianist Zhenni Li, known for her riveting performances.

New to the Festival is Gabriel Cabezas, a young cellist from New York described as a passionate musician, and award-winning violist Matthew Cohen, a featured soloist at concert halls around the world.

Krentz relishes bringing uniquely accomplished musicians together to create a memorable experience for the audience and the artists. "There's a certain thrill, an edge-of-your-seat adrenalin" that's different from an established ensemble, Krentz said. "It's neat — that whole creative part that happens on the fly. It's an incredible feat."

The five Centerstage concerts are June 18, 20, 23, 25, and 27 at Signal Hill Ranch, in a converted barn with impeccable acoustics and expansive grounds for relaxing before and after the performances. Every Centerstage concert day features a free open rehearsal in the morning.



The Festival will also include many opportunities to hear music – much of it free – at informal venues around the valley.

The Festival is bringing a string quartet from the Seattle area to perform familiar classical works at the TwispWorks performance pavilion for a free concert and informative lecture by Krentz on June 6.

The Festival celebration continues into July with concerts around the valley by the gifted young musicians of the Seattle Cello Academy, joined by academy instructors Krentz and Haeyoon Shin. Dates and times will be announced.

PIERRE BENSUSAN IN CONCERT



Cascadia Music is delighted to welcome Pierre Bensusan to the Methow Valley again, this time for Jazz in the Methow Memorial Day weekend. If "World Music" is music that pays tribute to the spirit of a collection of human beings through distinct rhythms, traditional instruments and harmonic colors, French-Algerian guitarist, singer and composer Pierre

Bensusan can be recognized as one of the most eloquent and world musicians today.

"Pierre's music gives me the shakes. No other guitarist shares his strange gifts of sophistication, accessibility, and downright joy. Even at its most complex, Pierre's music only needs ears to be enjoyed." ~ Leo Kottke

Born in Oran, French-Algeria, in 1957, when France was decolonizing its Empire, Pierre Bensusan's family moved to Paris when he was 4. He began formal studies on piano at the age of 7 and at 11 taught himself guitar. Influenced in those early days by the folk revival blooming in Britain, France and North America, Bensusan began first to explore his own diverse musical heritage and then moved to the horizons beyond.

At 17 he signed his first recording contract, and one year later his first album "Pres de Paris" won the Grand Prix du Disque upon his debut at the Montreux Festival in Switzerland

Described by the L.A. Times as "one of the most unique and brilliant acoustic guitar veterans in the world music scene today", Pierre's name became synonymous with contemporary acoustic guitar genius, long before the terms New Age, New Acoustic Music or World Music were invented. He has the ability to make a single guitar sound like an entire band as he brings the audience on a mesmerizing musical journey. And yet, Bensusan is more than what any musician or music lover expects from a guitarist. He is a composer as well as a bilingual and a brave improvisational vocalist, melding whistles and resonant low notes with something like his own scat technique.







SPRING IN TWISP

The snow is melting, the temperature is warming, the flowers are blooming, the sun is shining... although, let's be honest: in the Methow Valley, the sun is always shining! You've taken your Spring Break or long weekend away from the usual work grind to head to the foot of the North Cascades, when you notice your car passing through a brand new Art Gateway Installation, signifying you've just arrived to the eclectic town of Twisp.

Once you've parked downtown (which means anywhere on Glover Street - Twisp's main street), you'll find how easy it is to walk around town. It's best to experience Twisp on-foot, since you'll most likely notice things you wouldn't otherwise expect to encounter: a free little library from Methow Arts, a new exhibit at the Confluence Gallery, an 8-foot long metal sculpture of a yellow jacket ("Twisp" has become synonymous with "Wasp," or the sound a wasp makes), and even some aerial yoga and circus classes. Yep, less than 1000 people in Twisp and we still have both talent and passion for aerial yoga and circus classes!

Begin your adventure in Twisp by starting at the TwispWorks campus (where there's plenty of parking, including an EV Charging Station if you need it). Once you start meandering around the beautiful 6.5 acre campus, you'll soon notice all the artist studios that line the grounds of this former Forest Service complex. You'll find everything from species-specific bird nesting boxes to a natural dyes studio to a blacksmithing shop to an entire Methow Valley Jeweler's Collective! On warm days you might find other people lounging on the



plaza, nabbing a local brew from the OSB Taproom, or playing in the TwispWorks' splash pad.

If you happen to be in Twisp on a Saturday morning you'll want to sneak on over to the weekly Methow Valley Farmers Market in the Community Center parking lot, open starting in April from 9am-12pm.

Getting hungry? Grab lunch or a snack at one of several restaurants in Twisp - like a a delicious burrito and margarita combo at La Fonda Lopez, or a tasty homemade soup and salad at Glover Street Market (PS: the wine/oil/vinegar cellar at Glover Street Market is the best place to sneak for an impressive view while

Spring is a delightful time to stroll around Twisp, and you can anchor your walk with a tour of the town's public art. Swing by Methow Arts on North Glover Street & 2nd Avenue to learn about different locations around town where you'll find mosaics, murals, steel sculptures, and cast aluminum pieces. On sunny days - which, as we said, are customary around here - you won't want to miss the Twisp Ponds, a complex of meandering trails, native plants, large-scale art pieces, and salmon-rearing ponds. It's just a 1/4 mile easy walk from town, out Twisp River Road.

Errands to accomplish? No problem! Twisp is the central hub for Methow Valley services ranging from a pharmacy to a local auto parts center to a gourmet grocery market. Gifts galore can be acquired at Ulrich's, The Thrifty Fox, Glover Street Market, and Confluence Gallery's gift shop. For groceries, hit up Hank's Harvest Foods. Need a haircut? We have several salons right in town. Heck, you could even get a massage or facial if you've been looking for a chance to slow down and treat yourself on vacation!

You might rather just curl up with a good book and read for a couple of hours. No problem; our local library welcomes visitors and has a relaxed atmosphere for reading, as well as a great selection of periodicals and some downright friendly librarians. Or take your own book to one of the parks, located outside the Methow Valley Community Center and near the river by the pool.

After all that walking and sight-seeing, treat yourself to a cookie or eponymous pastry at the Cinnamon Twisp Bakery. Grab a coffee at the bakery, or might we recommend walking to the east end of town to get your java at the Blue Star Coffee Roasters café





and roasting plant, which you can view from the café through glass windows - okay, we'd understand if you wanted to hop in your car for this last caffeine hunt!

If you're swinging by Twisp in the evening, nab a bite of pillow bread cuscino and homemade pasta from Tappi Italian Restaurant, or some smothered porkchop and mashed potatoes from Linwood. Within walking distance are also options for pizza, burgers, tacos, and more!

If we can't tempt you into spending the night in Twisp during your stay (from a family-owned bed and breakfast to a pet-friendly hotel with river views), we hope you'll come back and visit us in the summer—we'll have a whole different list of seasonal ways for you to experience Twisp!

On behalf of the Twisp Chamber of Commerce, we hope





BRYAN PUTNAM: THE BIG PRINT



Bryan Putnam takes ordinary items of daily life like T-shirts and hats and turns them into a kind of mobile art gallery for his vibrant screen prints.

"An easy-to-collect graphic T-shirt is the most democratic art form," he said. It blends the graphic elements of saturated sumi ink with the aesthetic of woodcuts and lets him add vivid colors.

"Printmaking is important because it's a fusion of art and daily life in ways other art can't be," Putnam said. "It democratizes art because it's affordable and can go a lot of places. There's something really cool about an ephemeral print on paper or fabric."

Putnam was one of those kids who drew as soon as he could hold a pen. He created his first cartoon character, Mr. Bubble, at age 4. "From early on, I wanted to make drawings that told stories," he said. "I had the realization at 4 that I could create a world on this paper in front of me. It was the coolest thing I'd ever experienced, and I've never wavered."



While Putnam loved

teaching, he wasn't creatively fulfilled. So Putnam and his wife, who both grew up in the Methow Valley, picked up their young daughter and moved back home in 2016. Putnam juggled five jobs while "trying to figure it out."

He'd already been putting his art on T-shirts as a way of disseminating his art in an affordable way. To some degree, his screen-printing business, Pinetooth Press, grew organically as demand swelled. By January 2017, Putnam had opened his first print shop in a small storefront in Winthrop.

Later that year, to accommodate his

growing business, he and his wife Regan bought a 5,200-square-foot space in Twisp and renovated it as a design and production facility. A loan from the Methow Investment Network helped them buy state-of-the-art printing equipment. Today, Putnam's studio houses a massive automatic



driven embroidery machine.

with graphic novels and comic books. "My artwork comes out of the childish, said. "I could make things that were not otherwise possible, and knew it's what I wanted to do."

If you don't count the computers and high-tech printing equipment, Putnam's creative process hasn't changed much. "It's how I drew as a kid. I'd grab a stack of cheap paper, pencils, and pens and doodle, just to make things happen," he said. Once he's satisfied with a composition, Putnam refines it with digital drawing tools on his iPad and adds color.

Putnam's graduate program was interdisciplinary, and it challenged him to create art for gallery exhibits. "It was really amazing, and it really stretched me," he

Growing up in the Methow has shaped Putnam's interests and aesthetic. "It's always been about the confluence of humans and wild nature – it put that in my brain early on," he said.

Putnam's designs capture the experience of mountains and of Northwest culture, often with a comedic element. One tee sports a crafty raccoon sweeping litter from a campsite into a dustpan. Another, reminding people to "Take Care Out There," incorporates the ridgeline of the Sawtooth Mountains. Putnam did a colorful, dynamic image of a skier hurtling down a steep slope, with the sun flaming above the serrated peaks.

An elaborate drawing of a skull surrounded by a tangle of vines, branches, and perching birds is Putnam's riff on D.B. Cooper, the legendary figure who hijacked a plane and disappeared with the ransom money after he parachuted out of the aircraft. But the legend is just a starting point. "In the end, I hope it's just a potent story with a cool design," Putnam said.

Streamlined process

On a typical day at Pinetooth Press, the printing press is spinning, the embroidery machine is whirring, and someone is sewing. "It's pretty crazy," Putnam said.

He has five full-time employees and one part-time, working on art and design, printing, embroidery, and sewing. "Everyone who works here has some craftsman DNA – they all make stuff," he

Before buying the high-tech screen printer, Putnam did all the printing by hand, often putting in 12- to 14-hour days. Now, two or three employees load the shirts on the mechanical printer,

lining up the colors using a laser beam, and then transfer the printed tees to a drying machine. The printer can produce 10 T-shirts with up to six colors of ink in minutes. The printing process is non-toxic, using water-based inks and biodegradable solvents.

In another alcove in the big, open space, dozens of spools of thread are arrayed in rainbow-colored rows on the computerdriven embroidery machine. And Putnam is still playing with the potential applications of his newest machine, which cuts his designs out of wood, producing decorative screens that are like graphic filigree.

Pinetooth Press is the home for Putnam's original artwork on T-shirts, sweatshirts, hats, and mugs; as well as tea towels and other goods for the home. He sees it as part of a historic tradition of democratic artwork.

Putnam launched Printmade Apparel to create designs using a client's brand. Some shirts feature a trendy design with the company name; others incorporate their logo. "The goal is to make exciting products people want to wear, rather than just slapping their logo on it," he said.

Most of his clients are from North Central Washington, although commissions come from across the country. Bulging files contain film for the hundreds of designs he's created over the years, for theatrical productions at the Merc Playhouse to the Mission Ridge ski area to the Methow Beaver Project.

Putnam will give a presentation followed by Q & A on Tuesday, April 14 at Methow Arts during ARTISTspark, 5:30-7pm. An exhibit of Putnam's work will be on display at Methow Arts starting in mid-March-April.





No matter what he does, Putnam is dedicated to creating items with a high level of design – wearable art that will inspire people. "I don't want things tossed in the garage after a week to wipe up grease," he said.

Although he's busy fulfilling the demand for artistic apparel, Putnam still has stories to tell. He's been nursing a comic-book project for five years, a series of graphic novels – with a Northwest twist – about a hunter who battles mysterious creatures. "He's kind of a hunter of things he views as dangerously fictitious, like Bigfoot and other fantastic creatures and legends," Putnam said.

Putnam remains fascinated by these fundamental questions of truth and mythology. It's a theme he's explored from many angles – through huge drawings, performance art, and video but he wants to tell the story through the narrative flow of a graphic novel or comic book. "It's my baby," he said. "It's always going on, but it's hard to find time."

TIMELESSNESS AND STILLNESS THE PHOTOGRAPHY OF PEARL CHERRINGTON

Photographer Pearl Cherrington is one of the original members of the Winthrop Gallery which was started about 18 years ago in downtown Winthrop. But, her interest in photography begin long before that she was around 10 years old using her mother's old Brownie twin lens reflex camera. Growing up in the rolling hills of Kansas, she lived by a lake where she enjoyed going out into the woods and to the lake to take photos of the trees, the ice on the lake in winter and some of the rock formations. She still finds water, rocks, and shadows intriguing and good subjects for her photos.

She received her training at the University of Kansas in the School of Journalism. However, she was not entirely satisfied with the curriculum and was attracted to the School of Fine Arts and the School of Architecture. She was able to create her own curriculum and took courses in photography from all of these departments. The University had created a degree in general studies, and she convinced them that she wanted to emphasize photography, and she was allowed to do so.

When she is shooting, she aims for simple lines in what she calls a straight photograph complete the way she shoots it. She uses Photoshop sparingly for color adjustments. She wants to get the photo right the first time. She doesn't want to "tech it out". Some of her work is quite subtle, and she likes simplicity. She wants her viewer to see what she sees and has tried to convey. She doesn't believe that she will ever stop taking photos. She is learning all the time and tries different techniques. She recognizes that some images cannot be captured photographically which is a continual challenge to her. The camera cannot



always capture the lighting, the focus, or the magnitude of the beauty she sees.

People recognize her style which she has developed over the years. Even when she decides to do a mixed media piece, there is still the element of calm, subtlety, and simple design. Her photography is always on display at the Winthrop Gallery, and she also shows her work at the Confluence Gallery in Twisp on occasion.






The Winter's Tale is a directed film study program reaching across the Wenatchee Valley and across cultures.

Working with Randy Lewis, renowned Wenatchee storyteller, filmmakers captured and preserved these oral traditions while introducing students to the creative and technical processes of filmmaking.

This project takes its name from a time-honored practice when, in the deep of winter, a tribal elder would gather the young people around and begin to tell a story, a story about the land, about the powers of the animals roaming through it and about the relationship of the people to it all. These stories would unfold over not just hours, but over a period of days, delivered with a sense of poetry, a cadence that captivated the young listeners and imprinted on them deeply, connecting them to the land and to their own heritage in ways that would remain with them their entire lives, and ultimately would be told again in the deep of winter to the generations not yet born.

These stories exist still today and it is the purpose of this project to capture them in a form that can captivate the modern young mind.

PETER NAWROT WOODWORKING – FOCUSING ON THE GRAIN

Peter Nawrot has been creating beautiful, functional cabinets for people's homes for the past 22 years. After a few years of living on the west side, Peter retuned to the Valley and set up shop in the South Shed Building on the TwispWorks campus in late 2019.

We had a chance to sit down with Peter to ask him how he got his start in woodworking.

"My interest in woodworking began accidentally in 1996. I needed a job, any job, and the business that was hiring that day was Ballard Bookcase. If I hadn't walked through that door, I'm convinced I never would have discovered the craft that has shaped me. My career as a woodworker has revolved around residential cabinetry and furniture. While working in a shop that specialized in custom veneer work, I fell in love with symmetry and the repeating grain patterns found within trees.

This led me to salvaging my first tree, a 3' diameter Catalpa that was just 5 blocks from my house. For the next 13 years I sought out large trees specifically looking for unusual grain

patterns. The larger trees allowed me to match the grain and color throughout my work.

Today I only have a small percentage of that lumber left, but it represents the most unusual and beautiful grain patterns that each tree had to offer. My goal is to showcase these patterns in smaller decorative, but useful items. From cutting/charcuterie boards, carved platters, decorative pizza peels, jewelry boxes and furniture. The focus is always on the grain, because that is what I enjoy the most."

When not building cabinets, you will find Peter searching for new ways to showcase the unusual and beautiful grain patterns that exist in Washington trees. Contact Peter for information on custom cabinet work, decorative gift items, furniture or wood sculpture.


MESMERICA ... EXPECT A CIRCUS

Noticing our surroundings with a keen eye or rummaging around our minds for the passions and inspirations that we feel compelled to express are important to allow our creative juices to flow naturally.

Some people pursue creative endeavors because they enjoy complete focus and concentration or the exploration of problems and ideas of interest to them. They may or may not have any interest in sharing their art while others attempt to form a bridge of communication with other human beings by exhibiting their work publicly, either way is valid and important.

Find an outlet that allows you to express yourself in whatever form feels natural and the result of that will be your own creative expression, your art, your gift to the world or simply yourself.

A creative life is full of curiosity, possibilities, experimentation, self-expression and invention. It's a way of being that influences other aspects of our lives by compelling us to be more open, to listen, to be patient, to learn, to work together to solve problems and to be more understanding and accepting of our fellow human

Some artists claim that creativity makes them feel more connected to something bigger than themselves and when they neglect to make room for creativity they are not present in the moment and that's when worry, fear and judgment start to creep in. 


